Twin Rivers Taps 31-Year Veteran as New Acting Chief To Transitions into Part-Time Role and Consultancy

In early November, the Twin Rivers USD (TRUSD) found it necessary to place Chief of Police Breck on paid administrative leave. At that time, Captain To was asked by the superintendent to step in and provide temporary leadership for the department. By all accounts, both within Twin Rivers and through community feedback, To has done a remarkable job leading the team during a very difficult time.

Today the Twin Rivers Police Department (TRPD) is a stronger department, with more connection to the community, and better policies in place that reinforce the mission of this dedicated police team.

Now that a new leader for the department has been identified, To has requested a transition to a part-time role with the department. As a retired Sheriff and during his tenure with TRPD, To has acquired a wealth of knowledge and expertise. In addition to continuing to help TRPD with our community relations efforts and operational review, To will be starting his own law enforcement consultancy.

"I have mixed emotions about the transition. I am glad I was able to fulfill my commitment to the district, and I am also excited about my new business. Thankfully, I will be able to continue to work with a great team at TRPD. I am committed to their success, and I wish all the best to the new chief. I look forward to working with him," said To.

"We wish To the greatest success with his consulting business, and I would highly recommend him to any agency looking to improve operations. I am deeply grateful for his service and dedication to our district officers and communities. I am very happy that he will continue to have a role with TRPD as well," said Superintendent Frank Porter.

Scott LaCrosse, a 31 year veteran of the Sacramento Police Department will be stepping into the Acting Chief role. Most recently he served as a Captain in the Office of Investigations and is very familiar with the communities he will serve. Under SPD, LaCrosse served as the Area Commander for the northern half of the city, overseeing a staff of 171 sworn and 17 civilian employees from 2003-2006. He has also served in the SPD Information and Technology Services Division and as a K-9 Handler and Patrol Sergeant.

"I have a great deal of respect for the officers of the TRPD and look forward to continuing to lead them in a positive direction. I thank Acting Chief To for all he has done to bring the team to this point," said LaCrosse.

TRUSD and TRPD will continue the extensive operational review as promised late last year. If irregular processes or information come to light, detailed investigations will be conducted and appropriate law enforcement authorities or individuals will be tapped to provide expertise and conduct outside review.

"The involvement of appropriate outside agencies and individuals is important. It shows that we are committed to looking at our department from top to bottom. This will give our community and our own officers' confidence that the review is truly transparent and thorough," added Porter.

LaCrosse and TRPD will provide a variety of opportunities to meet the new chief in the coming weeks.
